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from the executive director

I am an avid e-book reader. Don't get me wrong, I swoon over physical books but there is something about always having a "book" on me that I find comforting. (Yes, I read on my phone. It's pretty big). Since e-books and recently, e-audiobooks, are my go-to I absolutely LOVE having free access to Libby and Hoopla through the library. That said, as a 2 books per week reader, I am frequently frustrated at the lack of e-books available and the long waits. And don't get me started about the number of incomplete series. Especially when Book #1 isn't even available. Being that I work in a library I know why this occurs, but many people do not. And it's something

that all libraries that offer e-books struggle with.

Libraries want to give their patrons what they want; we wish to fulfill every reader's needs but our hands (budgets) are tied.

There is no doubt that e-books offer convenience and accessibility, however, their availability through libraries is often fraught with restrictions imposed by publishers.

One major issue is cost. Unlike physical books, which libraries can purchase outright and lend indefinitely, e-books are often subject to pricey licensing agreements. Many publishers charge libraries significantly more for digital titles than consumers pay, and these licenses frequently expire after a set number of checkouts or a specific period—forcing libraries to repurchase popular books repeatedly.

Another issue is limited access. Some publishers refuse to sell new e-books to libraries immediately upon release, delaying availability by months. This frustrates library readers and diminishes the library's role in providing free and equitable access to information.

Usage restrictions also hinder libraries. Digital lending is governed by strict rules, often limiting the number of or not allowing simultaneous checkouts.

Finally, ownership concerns complicate matters. Libraries do not truly "own" e-books—they lease them under temporary contracts. If a publisher decides to pull a title from circulation, libraries lose access entirely. So while you may be discouraged with how long you have to wait or the limited amount of e-book titles we offer, it is not because we do not want to give our readers what they want. Paying significantly more for e-books than consumers and dealing with licenses that expire after a set time or number of checkouts presents us with many challenges, but our goal is to make digital content more accessible and the process less frustrating. And libraries are working hard to make digital content more accessible and affordable so that we can fulfill our mission of providing you free access to literature, information, technology, nature, and the arts.

These tasks are just a portion of our associates' responsibilities. Others include shelf reading to ensure that items are accurately shelved so that they can be easily accessed. Creating book displays is a fun aspect



of the job. Sometimes the displays are randomly chosen like cooking, or true crimes while others are themed around an event or program that may be upcoming. This is only a small portion of all they do in their job as Adult Services Associates. Our operations would not be possible without the dedication of our associates, and we are very grateful for the hard work they do in helping to keep the library running!
